CRIME DOWN



Latest crime figures for Northamptonshire show impressive reductions.

In line with Adam's Police and Crime Plan commitment to reduce violence by 40% over five years, latest figures show that excellent progress is being made. Figures show violence is down 14.6% compared to this time last year. Over the last 52 week period, Northamptonshire Police have had the second biggest fall in violence of any force in the country.

Data shows also that for theft of vehicles, July 2013 has been the lowest month for thefts of cars since the 1990s. The reduction over the last year has been the largest proportionally achieved by any force in the country.

Theft from vehicles is down 12% too year to date, meaning 170 fewer offences.

Adam said: "I am very pleased to see crime coming down across Northamptonshire and I want to thank all of the officers and staff whose hard work has made this happen. I look forward to the Chief Constable continuing to lead the further substantial reductions that need to be made."

OFFICE OF FAITH BASED AND COMMUNITY INITIATIVES

Evidence shows that programmes to treat drug addictions, stop alcohol misuse and to rehabilitate offenders are most effective when they are run in communities, by community groups and organisations with local knowledge and relationships.

This office is being created to support and grow the work of our community groups across Northamptonshire to contribute towards crime reduction, often by focusing on such issues as drugs, alcohol and emotional wellbeing. Our communities are brought together for a variety of reasons: geography, interests, religion and other shared demographics such as age and gender. Whatever their bind, this office will be looking to all communities to contribute to crime prevention and reduction in re-offending, as this is key to making Northamptonshire a safer place to live.

LAUNCH OF A POLICE, CRIME & JUSTICE INSTITUTE

Work to launch a police, crime and justice institute with the university of Northampton is well under way.

The institute will provide top flight research into matters which will help improve the effectiveness of policing and the criminal justice system in Northamptonshire.

It will also deliver vocational training to the police and wider criminal justice system agencies.

The institute is set to open in November 2013.

POLICE CADETS COMING TO KETTERING

Young people in Kettering will soon be able to get a taste of policing when a Northamptonshire Police cadet scheme launches in the town.

The scheme, which has been successfully running in Northampton for two years, is set to be launched in Kettering in January 2014.

Thirty places will be available and applicants must be aged 16 when the scheme starts on 6th January 2014.

Police cadets meet one evening a week to learn about the police service and develop practical skills. The new Kettering cadets will also work with local police and become part

of Kettering safer community team, helping out at events and offering crime prevention advice.

The Kettering cadets are asked to commit their time every Wednesday evening, 6pm-9pm during the school term, and volunteer to support their safer community team.

Adam said: "I'm excited the police cadet scheme is set to expand to Kettering. Plans are also underway for the scheme to expand even further next year into Wellingborough and Daventry. I have spent time with many of the current intake of cadets and have been really impressed with how enthusiastic they are and their contribution to making Northamptonshire the safest place in the country."
